Fr David writes...

One of the ministries I was involved in, when I lived in Melbourne, was working with people who had been ministering outside Australia for some time. Together with the Franciscan Missionaries of Mary sisters, we used to run what we called Re-Entry programmes for Missionaries. These consisted of eight days of intense debriefing of their experience in their missionary country and also trying to facilitate their re-entry into Australia. One of the main common concerns for them was of returning to a country, after sometimes 10 years, which they knew was not the same as the one they had left behind. Another common complaint was that their families and communities were treating them as if they had never left the country. These were people who would have gone through major challenges and changes in their lives in trying to adapt to a totally different culture. They would have grappled to learn a new language. Struggled with eating a different cuisine. Sometimes having to learn to live without necessities which we take for granted. They were Directors of schools or working in hospitals or community service within a different system and to top it all sometimes they would had gone through traumatic experiences themselves. Their families and community members who did not go through the same experience, would have had no clue about their struggles and for them, they were the same people whom they had known before.

On the other hand the people who were left behind in Australia, also had experienced changes in their

lives. The main concern for them was that they felt like they were strangers to one another. One had boxed the other and crystallised the other in a time warp. To re-enter Australia healthily, they needed the time to share their stories and deal with unfinished business back in their respective Mission. The Re-entry process is not for the faint hearted. Once they had done the work of looking at themselves and how the experience had affected them, they would be able to start the process of acceptance of the new reality, to enter their own home again but now in a different way. Because their experience overseas had changed them. They then would have a different perspective of life. And the ones around them needed to see them outside the box that they automatically had put them in. The experience did not make them better than others or superior to them. It just made them different. And being different can be perceived as a threat to people who love the status quo and feel insecure. There is a possibility of interpreting difference as arrogance. "Who does he/she think they are now that they have been away?" In today's gospel we see a similar dynamic happening. Jesus has come back home to the place where he had grown up. Everyone knew each other in Nazareth. They knew Jesus growing up and they knew that his parents were Mary and Joseph the carpenter. At this stage, Jesus had gone into the wilderness where he probably lived with his cousin John the Baptist, who was part of the Qumran Community. John the Baptist followed an ascetic programme similar to the Essenes in the same time period and geographical area near the Dead Sea. It is very probable that Jesus lived with them too. Jesus as we know had also gone through the temptations in the desert. All this tells us, that Jesus had a transformative experience before he returned home and preached in the synagogue that particular day. He was not the same Jesus they knew growing up amongst them. And yet they seem to have found it hard to accept this. His audience thought they knew him, "Isn't this the son of Joseph?" But what he preached, the fulfilment of the Scriptures, was shocking to the point of their attempting to silence him for good. In the face of such objection, Jesus does not change his message. On the contrary, he says that

By this, Jesus refers to himself as a prophet in the manner of Elisha and Elijah. The reference to Elijah going to the widow in Zarephath, and Elisha to Naaman the Syrian, prefigures Jesus' own ministry to those who are not Jewish. Luke here is foretelling the eventual Gentile Mission and demonstrating that it too, is rooted in Scripture. Just as Elijah and Elisha went beyond the bounds of the Israelites, Jesus will too. Luke's story of Jesus is rooted in the prophets, especially the ministry of Elijah and Elisha who raised the dead, fed the multitudes, and ministered to non-Israelites. Jesus behaves in a way wholly unexpected by those in his hometown who knew him best they thought. It was more comfortable for them to see him as he was – the son of the carpenter – than acknowledge that he is a prophet like the Old Testament prophets before him. Rather than silencing him for good, they might have reassessed their own preconceptions.

But as we know, as humans, such a task is difficult. It's much easier to believe what we already know to be true. On this fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time, we are invited to be open to the unexpected, for it simply might be the plan of God for us and we would reject it because it does not fit in our own preconceptions of another person or situation. Have we ever been in a similar situation, where we are shocked because a person acts out of character for us? Or were surprised by a situation because it was totally not as predicted? How do we feel when we are surprised by Grace?

So Guides and Brownies, your collection of 0.1 tonne should serve 143 meals, and satisfy the needs of 7 people for 1 week. Fantastic and thank you so much.
