## **Second Collection**

This week's second collection is for CAFOD Harvest Family Fast Day.

#### Fr David writes...

Life teaches us that things can go terribly wrong. People do make mistakes. We do fail in our commitments. Infidelities do happen. Hurt does appear on the agenda. Spouses do become victims and oppressors. Endless silences do happen. Marriages do collapse. We don't start off wanting all this negativity to happen. We commence most likely being enthused by the relationship. We truly believe that this partnership would make us happy. We dream of walking hand in hand into the sunset of life. We do hope for a happy and meaningful life together. And for some, this dream does happen. This year in our parish alone, we have been blessed to celebrate three of our couples' 50 years of marriage, two couples celebrating their Ruby anniversary and another couple celebrating their 60<sup>th</sup>. What a blessing for them and us as a parish! And they are surely a testimony that long lived marriages do happen, and people do work hard to keep their marriage going. However, there are other marriages which for one reason or another do not work out the way the couple hopes for. This brings a lot of heartache, not only for the couple involved but it effects the whole family system.

Recently a friend of mine disclosed to me that after thirty years of marriage, her husband confessed to her that he does not love her any longer and he needs time to understand what he needs to do next. Not surprisingly this news has had devastating consequences on the mental health of my friend. She confesses that she did not seeing it coming. So she is going through her own grappling with difficult questions. Was it her fault? Was she not enough for him? When did it go really wrong? Was she in denial? All these questions only help to exacerbate her self-loathing. Instead of feeling angry at him for inflicting such pain on her, she is trying to find fault in herself. Every relationship is different. Some relationships are worth fighting for. Other relationships especially if there is domestic abuse of any sort, one needs to find the inner strength to end them for their own sake and for the sake of their children. For whatever reason the relationship ends, it always leaves the individual, especially if he or she is the victim, feeling ashamed.

In society nowadays, separation and divorce are much more accepted. Not so long ago, it was a taboo and something to look down on. In the context of the Church, the question of divorce is still very controversial today. Pope Francis, although still championing the concept of marriage as being for life, he knows that we, the Church cannot put our heads in the sand in thinking that all marriages should work out nicely. Through his exhortation Amoris Laetitia, he is trying to look at the pastoral implications of divorced people within our church. In what way, can we still be welcoming and inclusive. On the other hand, as we know, there are elements in the Church inclined to take a much more rigorous attitude towards divorced people and they base their argument and reasoning on today's gospel.

Some Pharisees ask Jesus if it is against the law for a man to divorce his wife. The question of divorce was among the most divisive issues in Jewish Society. The book of Deuteronomy stipulated that a husband could divorce his wife for impropriety. Interpretations of exactly what constituted impropriety varied greatly, ranging from adultery to accidently burning the evening meal. Further, the wife was regarded under the law as the husband's chattel, with neither a legal right to protection nor recourse to seeking a divorce on her own. The husband could divorce the wife for almost any reason, and the woman was treated as little better than property. Divorce was easily granted among the male Jews in Jesus' time. In today's gospel, Jesus cites the Genesis account of creation of man and woman to emphasise that husband and wife are equal partners in the covenant of marriage. As an authoritative teacher of the Torah himself, Jesus cites Genesis in making an absolute prohibition of divorce, something allowed by the law. In a world where marriage was taken lightly because divorce was managed easily, Jesus calls everyone to go to the beginning to uncover the original plan of God. It's a call to return to the roots of marriage. This is not to punish the people with idealism, but to invite them to live in loyalty to God's original call.

In any case this prohibition was and remains extreme. We can see evidence that the early Church considered this extreme because Matthew's gospel which uses Mark as its source, already amends the prohibition and makes an exception for divorce in cases of unlawful marriage. Paul also, writing before the gospel was written, was aware of Jesus' radical teaching on divorce. Paul basically says that if a Christian has an unbelieving spouse who separates, the Christian person is not bound. Today the Church refers to this as the Pauline privilege and it applies for RCIA and other cases. As adult Christians we need to approach our faith with a certain maturity. Rather than accept at face value each and every saying in the Bible, or even each and every saying of Jesus, we discern the meaning of the text in a community of faith. That is what Pope Francis is trying to tell us in Amoris Laetitia. Today as we recommit ourselves to celebrate and support Christian Marriage for life, let us also be pastorally sensitive to those who were not so blessed in their marriages and who need us as Church more than ever in their plight to support them and welcome them.

At the end of Mass you are invited to take the candle home. In addition, those who wish to have other deceased loved ones remembered will also be invited to bring up a candle if they so wish. The Mass will be followed by refreshments in the Community Centre when members of our Pastoral Care Team will be present should you feel the need to talk to someone.
