Fr David writes...

We are fickle creatures. We can experience happiness to the point of being ecstatic one minute and sink to the depths of despair the next. We can sing the praises of someone now that we will despise later. There are usually reasons for the change of our emotions and attitudes. A celebration would naturally help us usually to feel happy whilst being plunged into an unexpected nightmare would push us into despair. With regards to dealing with people, it is a bit different. Sometimes we like someone for no reason at all. We intuitively feel that a person is nice even though we in reality do not know him or her that well. It could be their personality, their physical attraction – we just seem to click naturally. We get them. On the other hand we might dislike for no reason someone else. With others, sometimes we project our hopes and dreams. These are usually people with a charisma. They inspire us. They speak in a language that excites us. We get them. They nourish us by what they say and do. They seem to have some answers to our questions and needs. So we find ourselves supporting them. Sometimes to the point of making sacrifices for them. Unfortunately, we forget that they too are mortals with clay feet. So once for some reason, they disappoint us, we can turn totally against them in a minute. We feel let down by them. Our hopes and dreams are shattered. We feel deceived and betrayed. Some people feel so betrayed that they are ready to use also violence against them. They want revenge. From adulation, it turns into complete hatred and repulsion. So it is much easier to sing someone's praise when we think that person will live up to our expectations. But what happens when they do not? What happens when there is another path to follow?

The Church this week on Palm Sunday attempts to capture and express this fickleness in today's liturgy when we enter with the palm branches singing songs of praise only to cry out in unison moments later during the gospel – "Crucify him!" What are the reasons for this change of attitude? The crowds on Palm Sunday were full of hope and expectations that this young Rabbi who was entering into Jerusalem for the Passover, was bringing the much needed political change in the region. They were hailing him as the Messiah. They projected on him their dreams for a new liberated Land. They saw in him their own liberation. I can't even begin to imagine what Jesus was feeling on that day riding on a foal. He knew why they were hailing him as the Messiah. He understood on that day that they did not get who he was and the reasons of his mission on earth. They were just looking at him through their own temporal self-centred needs. Jesus was more interested in another kind of "Kingdom". Intuitively he must have felt that the end was getting closer for him. Jesus had been experiencing moments where he found himself having to confront the leaders of the people. He knew that he had made a lot of enemies in the ranks within the Jewish Community. He had to confront their hypocrisy and stand for what he believed in. He was too much of a free spirit to be controlled and tamed by them. He found it difficult to conform and they knew this. The only way forward for them was to get him out of the way. He had pushed a lot of the wrong buttons in them and unleashed hatred against him. The only way they could get hold of him was to turn the people against him. The people would turn against him if they realised he was not going to give them what they thought that he had promised them.

Crowds can be so dangerous and frightening. With a crowd mentality we lose our own sense of thought and reason. To be able to think for yourself, you need to get out of the way of an angry crowd. This Rabbi, Jesus, the anointed one needed to be exterminated. He was becoming a nuisance to the establishment. He needed to be silenced. The establishment had the power to do so. Is it a familiar story? It happens all the time. Once you try to shake a bit the status quo, people start to feel uneasy. You only need one person in the crowd to articulate the fears of the group or community, and the crowd

mentality takes over. Very easy to ostracise someone who is different from the group. Making them feel rejected. Evil can work wonders because of fear. We are entering into a week full of drama and pathos. Every single human emotion is going to be triggered in us. The liturgies of Holy Week and then the Triduum encapsulates the intensity of the human reality – that there are times where Love is found wanting. And evil triumphs. But the story continues....... Have a very blessed Holy Week! Let us keep in our prayers and thoughts those people and carers who are going through their own Passion at the moment in mind, spirit and body.
