Fr David writes...

Like me, I am sure, you would have met people whom you would have described as being a "good" person. What makes a person "good" in our eyes? Goodness we equate with generosity of heart. Someone who is usually unassuming and yet is ready to walk the extra mile in order to help others. In the context of Church, we might associate goodness with piety. A person who is always at church praying. However, good people are usually much more than pious people. They are people who are not interested in gossip, in judging others. They are people who avoid toxic people. Whose eyes radiate joy and peace. Good people are usually inclusive people. People feel welcomed by them. Good people normally do not know that they are good. They just are. They are people of integrity. Each one of us has our own interpretation of a "good person". It varies according to the value system which we hold dear to us. Moreover real good people are still human beings, having to struggle with their own demons and shadow side. Maybe it is not so visible, but the reality is that each one of us does grapple with our Achilles heel. We are all wounded in some way. Each of us has our vulnerable point. And the vulnerable part of us usually defines where we hold on to for our security.

Our sense of security is intimately linked with our identity. Education builds us up. Empowers us. It also gives us a good foundation to feel secure within ourselves. So how is it that we meet sometimes educated people who seem to be so insecure within themselves? That they need to show off their degrees and academic achievements every time they have a chance. A secure person does not need to prove anything to anyone. Or else some people feel secure surrounded by the latest gadgets and wealth. If they do not possess the latest item on the market, they feel they are a failure or a nobody. If our security and identity is defined according to what we possess, then we become enslaved to possessions. The need can become an addiction. The emptiness is so massive that we are constantly looking out to fill it up with things. Somehow, we need to learn even from an early age, that our identity and security is not based on external things or people, but from being comfortable in our own skin. In befriending ourselves. We need to like ourselves. Self -loathing transforms itself into so many different false securities.

In today's gospel, Mark paints a vivid scene of a rich man meeting Jesus on the road to Jerusalem. He is a good man. This man has sincerely tried to keep the Law all his life. Clearly though this observance is not enough. It is his dissatisfaction with mere observance that has led him to run to Jesus. Jesus tells him "There is one thing you lack. Go and sell everything you own and give the money to the poor, and you will have a treasure in heaven, and then come and follow me". Wow this young man did not know what hit him then. He was not expecting that answer from Jesus. Jesus is asking him to risk everything. He is inviting him to experience a freedom which is the result of not depending for his security and identity on possessions. This is scary stuff. He is being encouraged to live a life depending not on things but on providence. The cost of discipleship is too much. He turns and goes away, sad and disappointed, to return to the wealth that holds him from being a disciple of Jesus. The sorrowful departure of the would be disciple that Jesus loved is one of the most touching scenes in the Gospel.

The story of Jesus' encounter with the rich man and Jesus' teaching on wealth are issued as a challenge to us today. We live in a society that measures success in terms of economic growth and security, a society which rewards the rich with more riches. There is nothing wrong in being comfortable in life. The danger lies that our own values can centre on power, profit and property even at the expense of others. Wealth can become a mini god for a person who identifies his own security on money. One can easily loose one's moral compass. If our identity is locked into our possessions, who are we when our possessions are taken from us? We are afraid that if we have nothing, we are nothing.

Like the rich man in today's gospel, attachment to our possessions can soon lead to us being possessed by our attachments. When this happens we are no longer free to accept the invitation of Jesus. Attachment to material goods can steal our freedom to choose. Jesus wants us to enjoy our inner independence, so that who we are is not dependent on what we have. Detachment from possessions frees his disciples to pay more attention towards others. I truly admire those people who can risk because of their great faith in God's providence. Their inner freedom helps them to get out of their self-absorbed existence in order to engage in deeper priorities. Ultimately, once we put our focus on following Christ, everything seems to be into place. What are we called as individuals and as a family to listen to in this weekend's gospel message? Can we risk a bit more to engage more to the truths of Jesus?

As each individual name is read out a family member or friend will be invited to bring up a candle with the name of their loved one on it and place it by the statue of the angel in their memory. At the end of Mass you are invited to take the candle home. In addition, those who wish to have other deceased loved ones remembered will also be invited to bring up a candle if they so wish. The Mass will be followed by refreshments in the Community Centre when members of our Pastoral Care Team will be present should you feel the need to talk to someone.
