#### **Second Collection**

#### Fr David writes...

Sibling rivalry is real! Some of us have lived in families were competition was the norm. Sometimes even encouraged. As children we competed with our sisters and brothers for our parent's affection and attention. For this reason, some of us have resented having siblings. We were highly sensitive towards making sure that we had our mother's or father's full admiration. Unfortunately though, some of us grew up feeling that our parents treated us as second best. This was ingrained in our psyche, making us feel as adults either more determined to achieve or else always feeling like victims. Whilst others have felt that they were the preferred child at home. Once we experience ourselves as the blue eyed child, we become addicted to it. Somehow, some of us, as people, we feel constantly the need to excel. Some of us strive for excellence and success constantly at the expense of our health and relationships. This can make us feel superior than others and sometimes even arrogant. And if we fail, we feel that the world around had completely collapsed. Our self-identity revolves around being always the best athlete, academic or professional. There is no room for failure and vulnerability in our lives. We feel addicted to feeling and being "special". There is of course nothing wrong in being ambitious but when ambition becomes the primary focus in life, then there is a problem. As adults, we still have our "inner child" acting up. And we encounter dysfunctional families as adults whose issues stem from childhood. Dysfunctional parenting fuels this competition and resentfulness amongst the siblings even as adults unfortunately. I experience these dynamics sometimes amongst families during funerals. Once bereaved, we become vulnerable and this vulnerability heightens the negative unresolved issues within families.

Mark tells us in today's gospel, how the disciples respond to Jesus' second prediction today of his passion: "They did not understand what he said, and they were afraid to ask him". The disciples cannot comprehend the future of powerlessness that Jesus maps out for himself. They do not dare to ask him to clarify and instead they start their own discussion group about power and prestige. They were fighting about who was the most special amongst them. The disciples project their own unresolved sibling dynamics on Jesus. Jesus becomes the parent. When the group arrives in Capernaum, Jesus asks them what they have been arguing about on the way. It didn't take long for their seminar on power to grow into an argument about which of them was the greatest. To this question, the disciples respond with the silence of shame. It is in this silence that Jesus takes a little child, sets him in front of them, puts his arms around the child and challenges his disciples to accept the little one. When they can welcome that little child, they can welcome the real Jesus. A child was totally powerless at the time and community of Jesus. He or she had no rights at all.

A child is totally dependent on adults for emotional, physical and psychological needs. And yet the vulnerability of a child opens us up to the divine. Their sense of awe and wonder. Their openness to learn. Their spontaneity and creativity put us adults to shame. They perceive what we cannot see. Jesus is inviting his disciples to embrace the child first of all within themselves. The inner child needs to feel reassured and embraced and loved. The inner child is the key to help us understand ourselves now as adults. The inner child helps us to understand why we are triggered with anger or sadness in certain situations. The inner child helps us to understand our needs. We need to spend some time and come in touch with our child within if we really want to understand who we are today. The child might still feel insecure and as an adult he or she tries to over compensate with ambition, possessions and all kinds of addictions.

Jesus offers a permanent challenge to his followers to welcome the powerless both within and outside of themselves. He invites them to take to heart the weakest members of the community. He himself, places himself in their company. Special hospitality should be offered to those from whom we can benefit the least. Their vulnerability is something that Jesus not only shares but values. He really does put the "child" centre stage and makes him a symbol of the counter cultural sign for any Christian. He turns our modern value system on its head. Yet we like the disciples have difficulty seeing that. We continue to debate popularity, count twitter followers or Facebook friends, and admire those with power and authority. However in today's gospel we are reminded to consider those who have little standing in the world. Shock Horror! The great Christian spiritual writer Richard Rohr says "Christianity is a lifestyle – a way of being in the world that is simple, non-violent, shared and loving". Have we, as Christians, truly engaged with this counter-cultural value system yet?
