Fr David writes...

Our deepest yearning as children is to be loved unconditionally. We yearn to hear our father and mother whisper in our ears "I love you as you are". However, because we make part of a human broken world, we rarely experience ourselves loved unconditionally. So parents might find it difficult to accept their son or daughter who chooses to live differently than they had aspired for them for example. Sometimes parents feel let down. Sometimes although we are brought up in the same family as siblings, we usually have totally different personalities. Some children by nature are more independent. Some have free spirits. We can observe this even when they are infants. They have a knack of being different and adventurous. Others are more cautious and they value more the security and the familiar. No one is better than the other. It's just who we are. Most of the time, the adventurous one feels the need to find himself/herself away from the family system. They tend even geographically to move away from home. They unconsciously want to experience life away from home. Whilst there are others who's ideal is to remain at home sometimes even literally. This could be because of necessity – taking care of a parent for example or else because they do not feel secure within themselves for one reason or another to cut the umbilical cord, psychologically that is. As we have said, these differences in personalities can be found in the same family.

The evangelist Luke is a master storyteller. He crafts a brief but memorable narrative in today's gospel. The characters are stock. We probably know people like the sons in the story. Do we know people like the father though? Would we react like the father? Although we might or might not have lost wayward children, how do we feel when our children choose a lifestyle which we disagree with? In Jesus' time, children would have inherited only when the father died. The child who asks of his father for his inheritance before his death, was considered offensive. And he would have been punished by being disowned by the family. The younger son in the story asks for his inheritance and leaves home. The father seems to have no qualms in giving him his share. The younger son is the son who dreams of a better life away from home. He is the son who yearns for freedom – away from the believed restrictions of home. He is brave and secure enough within himself to embark on a journey away from home. However, being young he was not wise enough and squandered all his money. He experienced rock bottom. He yearned to eat the pods which the pigs were eating but no one gave him anything. Pigs in the Jewish community were considered unclean and the least of all animals. Luke wants to tell us here that the younger son became total destitute. Once he experienced rock bottom, he remembered that at his father's house, the servants had more than enough food for them to eat and he was starving. So he decided to go back and ask his father to take him in as one of the servants.

In our gospel Jesus gives us a parable that illustrates the abundant mercy of God. A son who had offended in such a way his father, would never dream of going back. For the family, this kind of son is dead. And if he happens to decide to return, the family would probably kill him. It was a matter of honour. The father respects his son's freedom. Moreover, he never stops watching for this son to return home. And when he does catch sight of his wayward son, the father does not wait for the son to complete his journey or to speak the words of contrition he had so carefully practiced. The father immediately plans a feast to celebrate his son's return. It's as if Jesus wants to tell us that we only need to turn towards God for our merciful Father to run out to meet us and welcome us back home. God truly loves us unconditionally. The older son though is different kettle of fish. He is the son who never left home but is full of resentment and is envious of his brother because he had done what he wanted. So the elder son did not stay home because he wanted to, but for whatever reason he could not make himself leave and so is envious of his brother who was not scared to set off.

If living our Christian life makes us resentful, envious and ungrateful, we need to check our motivations for

remaining. The younger son went back home because he had now **chosen** to return home. The one who remained at home took his life for granted and lost the sense of gratitude for what he was granted as gift. The father had to go out of his house to meet his elder son because the elder son was enraged by his father's mercy and love towards his younger brother. The father reassured him of his love for him and must have felt sad to know that his elder son was not celebrating the return of the younger brother. As we continue our Lenten journey, this beautiful parable today helps us to reflect on the three characters in the story. Who do we identify with in the story? The father, the younger son or the elder son? Are we people who are inclusive especially within our community of faith? Or are we people who are exclusive? Do we very easily judge others and feel resentful and jealous of other's way of life? God loves us unconditionally and is full of mercy. We only need to decide to return to him and we would be embraced warmly wholeheartedly.

GIFT AID

Please note, the amount of Income Tax and/or Capital Gains Tax you pay or will pay during a tax year must be at least equal* to the total amount of tax that all Charities (i.e. not just St Jmes) will reclaim on your gift-aided donations to them for that tax year. Other taxes such as VAT and Council Tax do not qualify.

*You must have paid at least 25 pence in Income/Capital Gains Tax for every £1 of gift-aided donation you make to <u>all</u> charities (i.e. £25 tax for every £100 given). If you pay less Income/Capital Gains Tax than the amount of Gift Aid claimed on all your donations in that tax year, it is your responsibility to pay any difference to HMRC.

Please also speak to Geoff if:

- 1. You are unsure that you will have paid adequate tax,
- 2. You wish to know the total recorded amount of your offerings.
- 3. You move or marry and change your name. (It is important that our records of your name and address is recognisable to the tax man)
- 4. You wish to transfer your gift aid donations into your spouse's name (perhaps because you have stopped working and no longer pay tax),
- 5. You would like to Gift Aid your contributions to St James' but have not yet completed a Declaration Form.

As every charity will tell you, by gift-aiding your donations your contributions are substantially increased at absolutely no cost whatsoever to you. If you are not already in our Gift Aid scheme, all you have to do is sign a Declaration Form enabling the Church to recover the tax you will have already paid before making your donation.
